For Farmers—Funding is now available to install BMPs!

- If the rains have caused gullies to form in your fields, consider installing a grassed waterway or field border in your field! Protect your field and your equipment by providing a grassed 'swale' to allow the water to leave the field without eroding.
- Cost Share funds up to 75% of (pre-established) average costs are available for these and other practices to help offset the costs of installing BMP's for your farm.

Interested cooperators may apply to Guilford County Soil & Water Conservation District for financial and technical assistance PRIOR TO installation of BMPs to protect water quality. Applications are ranked based on resource concerns identified in the county.

WE ARE NOW TAKING APPLICATIONS FOR ALL PROGRAMS! Our first batch cutoff date is August 21, 2020. So get those applications in so they can be ranked for consideration. The applications can be found on our webpage at:

Conservation Irrigation

According to the 2002 Farm and Ranch Irrigation Survey, approximately 27 million U.S. acres are under sprinkler irrigation. About 80 percent of these acres use center pivot systems. Studies on the High Plains show that if the acres under medium pressure systems were converted to low pressure, the energy savings could add up to \$15 per acre. The conversion of high-pressure systems to low pressure could result in savings of up to \$66 per acre. Nationwide, farmers could save up to 27 million gallons of fuel and \$55 million per year.



Another new water system we have seen interest in is the Sub-Surface Drip System. This system supplies water at a very slow rate, underground; using low volume, low pressure, directly to the roots of the plants.

What's even better is that these practices can be costshared through the NC Agricultural Water Resources Assistance program, (up to \$25,000) if you're converting from a traveling gun system



Conservation IRRIGATION has arrived in Guilford County!

If you have seen some crop circles, and you think maybe you're seeing things? Maybe not! Although previously not found in Guilford County we have several Center Pivot Irrigation Systems now being used. They are computerized, motorized and can be used to apply fertilizer and herbicides along with the water; creating a more efficient system of growing crops. They use less water and can be programmed to apply late evenings and early mornings for better water usage, less water loss.
