



Our Mission:

.....to promote the conservation of natural resources in Guilford County through education, information, technical assistance, and available economic incentives.

The Guilford Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) is a governmental subdivision of the State of North Carolina, charged with the responsibility of promoting soil and water conservation and establishing conservation programs in the District. The District partners with the Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS) to carry out these responsibilities. As a local organization, we work with citizens, agencies, and landowners to plan and direct programs for the conservation and development of our natural resources. We work closely with other state, federal, and local agencies, such as NC Department of Agriculture, NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources, NC Forest Service, NC Cooperative Extension, etc. to provide effective natural resource management and environmental education.

Yes, there are still nearly 1000 farms, and 95,500 acres of farmland left in Guilford County, down from 5000 or more in the 1950. However, Guilford ranks in the top 50 (of 100 counties) for 10 major commodities, and in the top 10 for strawberries, nursery products, and milk cows. Guilford is still a top player in North Carolina's top industry, yes that is Agriculture, and has a lot to lose if our farmers and farmland goes away.

The Guilford Soil & Water Conservation District is here to assist farmers and landowners with soils information, technical assistance, environmental education and more. We can provide financial assistance to qualified landowners to help them install Best Management Practices (BMPs) on agricultural and non-agricultural land. The district staff provides technical assistance for the Voluntary Agriculture District Program, Envirothon, Division of Soil & Water Conservation, USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service.




One of our winning conservation farms with BMPs installed: Grassed Waterways, Field Borders, No-Till

Milley Langley



Did you know? Pocosins consists of flat areas on hills predominant in the Croatan National Forest that typically are made up of black organic muck, thick-stunted vegetation, and highly acidic soils?

These features were formed as a result of a series of physiographic and biological changes occurring within the last 900 years. Native Americans referred to this

unique land feature as "Swamp-on-a-Hill. US Forest Service. There are theories that these features were formed by ancient meteorite impacts or whale-wallows when the sea level was much higher. E.D.




OTHER NEWS & UPCOMING EVENTS:
